At the conclusion of the song, the LADIES retire to a safe distance, and engage in quiet conversation. The PIANIST removes the NEWSPAPER from the PIANO. Meanwhile, the BARITONE takes out some sheet music and reads from the cover:

BARITONE: "Before the Battle - a graphic evocation of the glories and perils of war."

(turns the page, and continues reading)

BARITONE: "Vividly depicts the thoughts of one of our brave boys marching off to war- the terrible scenes of carnage- the booming of the cannon, like the very voice of the mountains- the tolling of the bell ringing out for the dead- our hero, left dying and alone as he gladly lays down his life for the glory of..."

BARITONE: Oh, the last part is missing! Still- sounds just the ticket!

The LADIES look as if their worst fears have been realised. During the early part of the solo, they occupy themselves by playing cards and looking at stereoscope slides. Their conversation gradually builds up to bar 70. Thereafter, their conversation is carried out in mime.
